Conflicting tasks in the fall, and with no second-string quarterback/assistant patrol leader to take over for your loyal editor/publisher, left the fall issue unproduced and reverts here to catching up by combining the Fall 2025 and Winter 2026 editions into this issue, trying to make it doubly engaging. I got some great material from the Alumni Reunion in October, and from alumni Tom (“Anvil”) McKinney (Fayetteville Troop 102, Post 200; Camper ’64, ’66, 67-69, Staff ’70, 78-79) and Jason Winget, Troop 72, Homer, Louisiana (Camper, 1992), shared in this double issue. Read on!

OLD PICS – WHAT ARE YOUR MEMORIES?

From Jason Winget’s summer 1992:

This is the ford at the upriver edge of camp, a required crossing on the way to Signal pine or Hemmed-in-Hollow, just beyond what is now the council fire ring. Note right behind the tree in the middle is low, hand-made stone dam across the river. This created a deeper “hole” upriver as the canoe/rowing venue. What years was that dam used? Surely it had to be rebuilt each summer, did you help rebuild it?





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Note at the west end of the assembly field beyond the flagpole where the Gaga ball pits are now located, a net. Badminton? Volleyball? Something else? When was that net there? Who played whom when? Did you ever play there? When and why did it leave?

And the rowboat...what's with the rowboat!??

Old Frisco on the end of the assembly field opposite the flag poles – it now sits a couple hundred feet south and uphill of there near the Order of the Arrow Hogan. When did Old Frisco show up? When, why and how was it moved? And there's one flagpole (right behind the bell); three now...when, why and how did that change?





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Osage campground, which coming from the main camp area, is on the right/south, 100 yards just past the Camp Director's cabin. This was amidst deep woods for the first thirty-five years of camp – but a 1992 forestry plan for Camp Orr recites the camp area had just been timbered, leaving the relatively thin forest seen here.



The original Camp waterfront, on the gravel/sand bar opposite the huge, iconic, tilted, square rock below Gar Hole Bluff. For the recent few summers, at least, the swimming part of the waterfront has been the next hole upriver. Wonder how many times that has changed, as the river has changed its holes, depths and banks!?

....and replaced about half of the posts supporting the Scout Law signs on the long entry drive through the riverside meadows (Herb Haile and Rick Hammerle hard at work) ...,



...along with refurbishing all the individual Scout Law signs themselves – “before, during and after” pictured below:



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Bryan West showed up with his truly museum quality display of scout uniforms and patches, and we finished our outdoor work by Saturday early afternoon, just in time to bring everyone into the dining Hall during a toad-strangler rainstorm Saturday afternoon.





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We were joined at lunch by about half of the professional Council staff from Little Rock, as well as the Council's own volunteer post-camp inspection team, and by the Council's Camping Executive (Haley Hunt) who was hosting an applicant for next summer's Camp Director position, which she introduced to us. Apparently, the camp and we impressed him: Mark Gormly, who has long and deep scouting and camp management experience in other

states has hired on to be Camp Director, 2026!

As with prior reunions, National Park Service representative and Orr Alumni Fenn Wimberly (right, standing, above) gave us an update and rundown on Buffalo National River goings-on; that's always relevant, Camp Orr being the only Scout camp in the nation within a National Park, and bound by mutual easements about how we respect each other's missions.

Throughout the afternoon, we had the Razorback vs. Texas A. & M. football game on the big screen in the dining hall (yes, of course, the Hogs lost, again, by a hair) and relaxed conversations. With the rain still pouring, we had dinner (Evan Graham's home smoked chickens and pork loin – yum!) and then moved our campfire into one of the Dining Hall fire places, and kicked things off dividing into two teams for a close match of quiz bowl on Orr history (test yourself: Exactly when did the Living History Program end? When was the first year of campers? Who have been the last four Camp Directors?) Then, a requirement that each attendee share at last one camp memory, turned into a 3-hour flood of memories – interesting, fun, hilarious (confining staff member to their tent by wrapping it with Saran Wrap? Fight Night in the Dungeon? The staff carrying a full-sized water heater to Signal Pine so the next Troop up would have to bring it down to claim Signal Pine supremacy?!). We kicked off a fund drive for a new teaching pavilion at the Camp (see below article) and headed home Sunday morning. Thanks much to Camp Ranger Billy Williams for his support and Karen Harris and the kitchen crew for keeping us well-fed!

TWIN FALLS: A PROFIT CENTER?

Camp Orr's Twin Falls has now become, and is sometimes called, "Triple Falls". Once a "best kept secret" of Camp Orr Scouts, many of whom take the short half mile trek to be wowed by its beauty and ice cold water on hot summer days, and in Camp's earliest days use it as the primary "shower" facility, the Falls, despite the arduous road in and out, have become one of Newton county's most visited tourist sites. Although visitors occasionally cause parking issues at



Camp's entrance or wander into Camp Orr, the Council and Camp have consistently allowed these sightseers, whose numbers now reach thousands annually, to visit and enjoy the Falls. A concept pending for many years, the Council in December finally put signage and a contribution box at the trailhead parking area, hoping the tourists will express their appreciation for our sharing the Falls with donations. The poster was created by Molly Harper, a Texas Life Scout/ Camp Orr alumni, who attended Camp Orr (and Twin Falls) with a provisional troop last summer, 2025. Keep your fingers crossed!

CAMP ORR ALUMNI ASSOCIATION FUNDS BUFFALO TRAIL PAVILION

A now defunct Troop (110) sponsored by a now defunct church in Fort Smith, last year donated its remaining checking account of \$1,000 to Camp Orr. Camp Orr badly needs a pavilion for its Buffalo Trail program (getting new scouts from Tenderfoot through First Class), heretofore held under altogether inadequate stretched

tarps to protect from sun and rain. The Council committed the \$1,000 contribution to the Alumni Association to see if we could fund the pavilion, at a total cost of \$5,400. Starting with our alumni at the reunion, followed by solicitations on our Facebook page, within weeks, we raised the full amount, plus a bit - Thank you Alumni!! This shelter will contribute significantly to putting young scouts on the trail to Eagle. We are meeting with the National Park Service this month to get their approval (required by our easements for any new construction) so we can hopefully have it place for Camp Orr 2026. Thanks for your support!

SHOOTING SPORTS ARE BACK! Do you remember archery, riflery, and shot gunning at Camp Orr? Staffing the shooting sports program, now called Range and Target Activities, is more of a challenge than you would imagine. Not only does the senior staff program manager for that have to attend the weeklong National Camping School, before but various training and credentials, offered at separate and limited times and places throughout the year by the NRA, must be currently earned by the staff, such that a person otherwise of an age and interest to staff in the shooting sports can't simply sign up in March and be qualified. That has resulted in Camp Orr not having the shooting sports programs the last two summers. Anticipating and solving that problem, Council staff has the shooting sports staff already filled for 2026 and it will be fully operational!

TIME MACHINE: GOING BACK TO 1963, 63 YEARS AGO...

Thanks to Tom (Anvil) McKinney, we have the Council Newsletter dated May 27, 1963, which was mailed to his mother, a volunteer scouter in 1963, taking us on a time travel to 63 years ago. All eight pages follow at the end of this edition, but here are some highlights:

- Camp Orr was announced “full” for its 1963, 4 weeks of camp with 13 of its 14 campsites full every week, that’s 52 troops! For some reason, Shawnee was not available that summer. Camp Orr presently has 20 troop campsites and after the pandemic is working its way back to filling those again for all four weeks.
- All of the Troops were from Westark Council. If you are a really old-timer, that would be as you expect. Presently, only five to ten percent of troops attending Camp Orr are from what is now the Natural State Council, formerly Westark, but the Camp is booked for about 30 additional weekends per year for Westark Area scout activities: Order of the Arrow events, District camporees, troop campouts, weekend on ropes (would you believe 400-500 attendees)? Alumni reunions, workdays, youth and adult training, and more, so by the time summer camp rolls around, our council scouts have seen much of Camp Orr and seek variety for their summer camp experience – and out-of-council scouts, numbering close to a thousand each summer, are eager to appreciate what Camp Orr offers.
- “Final payment of \$8.00 is due”; that completed the \$15.50 per camper fee for the week at Camp Orr! – presently, that costs \$350 to \$450 per camper, depending on how early or late you register, almost 25 times what it cost then!
- Mount Magazine District registered every single one of their troops for Camp Orr. Remarkable! That District no longer exists, having been folded into the Ft. Smith-based Butterfield Trail District.
- A complete, new, scout uniform cost \$10.75 - a plain neckerchief now costs more than that!
- Over 8,000 people attended the Council Scout Exposition!

- The entire Camp Staff for summer 1963 is listed, a real piece of archival information! – you old timers, who do you recognize?

The 8 pages of the 1963 Council Bulletin follow: Two pages of Council information, a separate page for what then were the four Districts: Northwest, Butterfield Trail, Magazine Mountain and Ozark (Northwest became Cornerstone and Razorback, Magazine Mountain merged with Butterfield, and only Ozark remains Ozark), the address page, and the special page listing the coming summer's Camp Orr Staff!

But if you were not among the 8,000 people that attended and over 50 Scout Units that participated you are the loser.

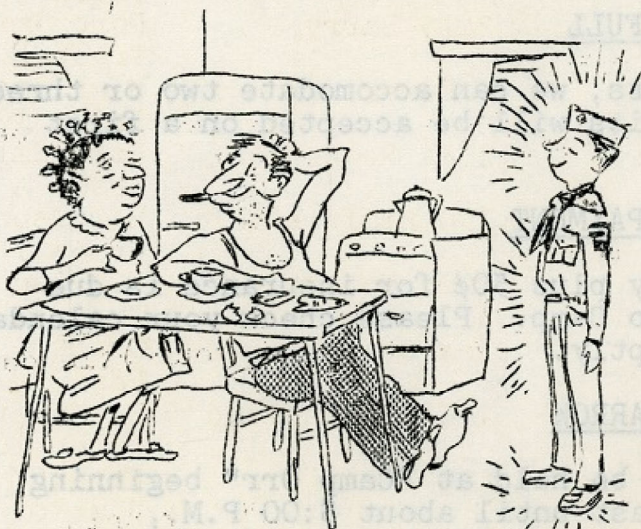
